Q12 Which is more important: meeting community / design goals or meeting environmental goals?

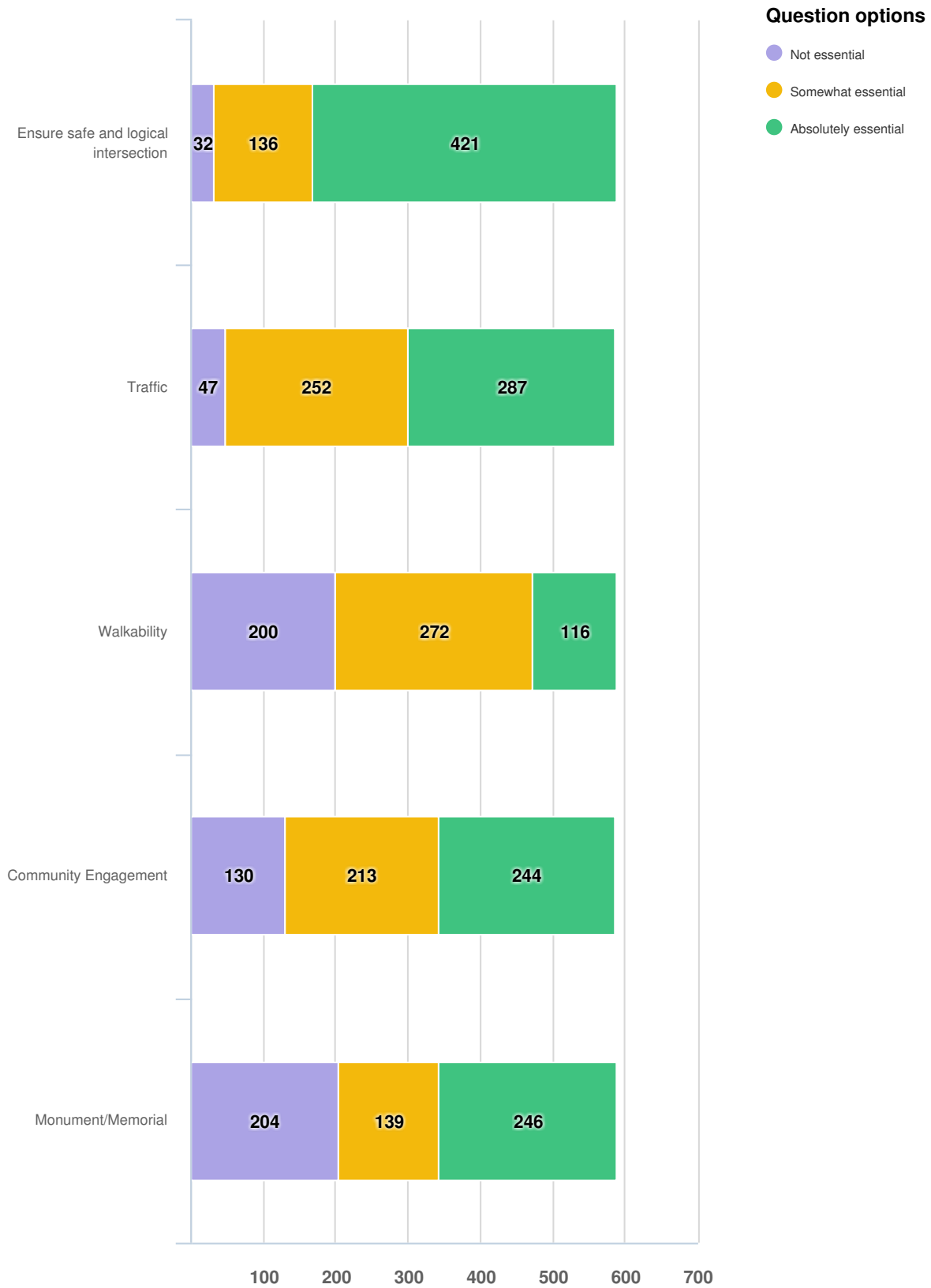

Therefore, rec rooms, patio spaces, and community engagement rooms are not necessary as we have these. Anything being built not specifically for the police department should be taken up with parks and rec. This community has suffered unending millage increases to sustain the city and it must not be taken advantage of. It would

be great if this project could drastically reduce its budget.

That the design is most functional for the officers serving our community.

If you were to eliminate the indoor pistol and rifle firing range from the proposal, you could repurpose the space to actually help the community instead of receiving weapons training.

The campus should seek to serve the community via the police, not just to be a police resource.

As the business manager for a local design firm, all to often I see the conflict between design & function, and when design stands few are happy; generally only the designer for the photo op, not those who have to live with it.

It's a police station, not a community center. Stick to the basics and stop trying to appease the vocal minority. I couldn't even answer some of these questions due to the inherent bias of the available responses.

This area needs to be safe for the officers as well as any member of our community that is visiting the campus. The design should be 100% centered around safety. The police office does not need to be a place for public meetings and gatherings. It is a place of business where the jobs people perform can be very dangerous. There is no reason to put large numbers of citizens at risk.

Restricting their facilities is not the manner to create a more beneficial community oriented police department. Thank you city of Fayetteville for asking for ideas and providing a venue for response during this unusual time. Safety and security are the essential elements for the overall design, form, and function of the campus in relation to the officers and support staff of the Fayetteville Police Department. For far too long this agency has relied on antiquated facilities for their overall goal, which is community service. The thought of not completing this project is a slap in the face to every person employed by the Fayetteville Police Department, past, present, and future.

This should NOT be a place for the community to gather. We should had an officer killed at a police station. What police need is to feel safe and be protected not provide more ways to get killed.

We do not need a large outdoor space for gatherings or community activities. The priorities of this campus should be a functioning place for law enforcement to do their job. The fact that this survey is HEAVILY skewed to reflect themes like "walkability" and a "community resources room" speaks volumes about the current city council. It is unacceptable that barely 8 months after the death of Stephen Carr that this council is giving the police department roadblock after roadblock. It is frankly disheartening and disgusting. Build the PD for our officers. Build it the way they need it to be built. If you want a separate building for "community services" then build that at a later date.

This new police department campus has its challenges ahead of them,

however it doesn't come from topography or walkability or things like that. The challenges come from trying to put everybody and include everybody in a project that they don't need to. City Council Members should trust their Police Department to make a great headquarters and STAY OUT of the decision making process. The Fayetteville Police Department has shown itself to be a progressive, dedicated, and competent department. If the police (and planners with the city making this project) need help or input into the design, I'm sure they would reach out to the proper people to get it. The city council needs to get their hands off this project and let the police department (and planners again) do their jobs. Your concerns about a berm and walkability are laughable, how dare you try and hold up a project to play a political game. The city that values "walkability" over the safety of its officers? The last time that the city ignored requests for a gate at the current police headquarters led to the murder of an officer IN THE BACK PARKING LOT. While you sit around and discuss your superfluous ideas for this project, think of the life of Officer Karr, and maybe you'll remember why we need this project in the first place.

I object to the lumping of all "safety" concerns above into one single category. What does it mean I rank "Traffic" as essential, separate from a logical intersection?

I think there is good intent in including community services and spaces in the proposal. But operating under the illusion that these spaces will be embraced and used by the community is fallacious and frankly ridiculous. If the city of Fayetteville wants to invest in its community it will build community spaces without an oppressive police headquarters attached.

Campus should be selfsustaining in times of disaster. Solar energy should be a must have part of the design,

The plan to provide our police department with the necessary space for training and carrying out their duties is essential. This was decided and should be carried out and not hindered by political views.

If a blank wall is supposed to face a neighborhood, think about possibly having a local artist make a mural. Maybe a memorial to Officer Carr, or something that symbolizes community togetherness. Fayetteville is unlike any other city in Arkansas! We come together! Fayetteville police have a presence in the community that make the citizens feel safe and comfortable instead of fearful.

I look forward to welcoming this facility to the area and hope that the original plans that the city voted on are honored without minimization from those who wish to create divide between our incredible FPS and this vibrant community.

Again, this needs to be focused on what law enforcement needs to do their job, not on making it a feel-good community center.

Please take care of our police department.

I do all of my shopping in Fayetteville, and I supported all of the bonds because I am happy to pay sales taxes that make Fayetteville the best place possible.

It should be a secure police station and nothing more.

This campus will be the perfect platform to build and foster a growing relationship between officers and citizens. Every goal should be aligned with

this overall vision.

Yes. This station should not exist. FPD has shown that they have racist tendencies: with 26% of simple possession of marijuana arrests being attributed to a 7% Black population. 50% of arrests by RSOs were Black children. Flooding money and infrastructure to a racist police force only exacerbates a problem that is currently in the international spotlight.

I want to urge the consideration of a sobering/detoxing space built into the design, as well as the consideration of a well staffed social services office so that this station can perform functionally as a liaison between community members in crisis and non-carceral solutions.

I don't think this expansion is necessary at all, I think we should be reassessing the need for the number of officers needed vs community services that could replace that number - then the remaining officers would be experienced enough and emotionally intelligent enough to do their jobs, without having inexperienced and unprepared officers that worsen community trust and have too much on their plate.

I don't agree with this project so my concern is with staying on budget and not creating police specific design elements that require further funding. The most care should be placed on incorporating training and space for social service programs within this facility.

It is tone deaf and violent to invest such a significant amount of money into policing and law enforcement as the world reckons with racism and white supremacy as the foundational values of our systems of law enforcement. Fayetteville arrest disparities make it clear that, despite what the white leadership of Fayetteville suggests, Fayetteville law enforcement are no different than national trends, and policing in our community is driven by racism and white supremacy. This initiative was promoted deceitfully and passed based on a ridiculously small voter turnout. The vast majority of votes of voted "for" this didn't realize they were voting for a \$40 million dollar law enforcement initiative. They were tricked into thinking they were voting for arts opportunities.

I'm not concerned with the design of the station, I'm concerned with its planned existence.

Fayetteville can do better than this, please actually help those in our community who need it.

Officer input is important. Too often it feels we build new buildings to look pretty, but the architects haven't listened to input from all employees there (top to bottom) and end up with spaces that aren't functional because design was favored. Give all officers a chance to provide input on design and necessary spaces.

Put it somewhere else, and make it cheap.

It should be a safe place to work. It should be handicap accessible and allow the employees adequate places to perform their daily tasks and participate in safety and OTJ training. Additionally, it should have appropriate facilities for shower/changing for all employees. The community should feel welcome and invited.

Increase funding for social programs, reallocate away from police funding.

Aesthetically pleasing that reflects the community of Fayetteville. Bright colors, lots of natural elements, and commitment to treating people well.

Do not build this.

I'd rather see the funds go toward community building than community policing. I think investing elsewhere, like schools or job training programs would do more to prevent crime than this project. I feel like recent events have proven this project unsmart and unnecessary.

This survey does not address the major issues voiced by citizens. It's immoral to spend our tax money further policing our communities, when we could be providing real services - housing, medical and mental health care, and workable public transportation.

This survey was poorly written and seemed design to only get support for the police station and to elicit answers that will be used to claim community support. Very disappointed in this.

Fuck the police

Don't build it. We don't need it. You're endangering everyone who isn't rich and powerful.

Waste of \$30 million. The police don't need to be glorified. Give that money to help homeless causes and to build and renovate parks.

Again, why this location? Why this outpouring of millions of dollars where money could be allocated toward services that would reduce the need for so much policing of citizens that 9 times out of 10 just need help? There were not any polling places in Gutierrez's ward. Yet this is moving forward. How do those in FHA housing down the road feel about this new "safety" campus? What's the outreach that's been done? And what proportion of the votes came from communities who have never had to be policed/had police patrolling their neighborhoods constantly?

This space won't feel welcoming to the community if the police are there. Unless the police change drastically. Design won't make that any better. Monuments won't make people feel welcome either.

A gun range is unnecessary. Also police should not be allowed to drive at excessive speeds at their leisure around the facility or anywhere else like they do around the jail and the rest of town.

The Fayetteville Police pretended to stand in solidarity with the community by kneeling with us at the BLM rally in June, but are now proceeding to leech over 30 million dollars from the city budget for this obnoxious and unnecessary new building. If they really cared about our city, they would put this money towards non-police social services that actually benefit the community, instead of building this monument to police in one of Fayetteville's blackest neighborhoods. If this project goes forward, it's because Fayetteville Police do not care and will not change.

Design elements should closely represent the men and women who serve at the Fayetteville Police Department. However, special attention should be paid to overall flow of the complex

I think that more funding should be reserved toward things in the city like more access to mental health and social services and resources for the homeless.

The police department does not need a \$33.5 million upgrade. Reallocate those funds where they're more needed.

Change the location. Don't put the neighborhood residents at risk

I want a community center that serves the community and that does not involve the police.

We do NOT need more policing in Fayetteville, building this site is a mistake that will negatively impact the entire community. The entire budget should go into housing support / education / mental health services / and community services.

Do not build this police station and return the bond. Ward 2 did not have a

polling place to vote for this and there was not enough outreach prior to the vote. The increase in police presence has been shown to increase police violence. Implementing protocols like no chokeholds has been shown to have no impact in police violence.

The most important design element for this campus is safety, for the FPD and for Fayetteville citizens, as long as the city building standards are met. Everything else is secondary. Of course I'd like the campus to be aesthetically pleasing, but my idea of that may be very different from yours! Your survey mentioned CPTED standards. Were those standards part of the requirements for design? They were not mentioned in any part of the survey. Those standards are not specifically for a police station or campus, but seem to be part of an overall city design standard. Are CPTED standards listed as an integral part of Fayetteville planning and design? If so, why are they not mentioned in the home page of the website describing the project?

That adding a police campus in neighborhoods with high poverty levels and larger populations of BIPOC inadvertently increases the policing of these communities.

Safety is most important.

It is essential that police are not housed in this building if it is hoped to serve community through social programs and safe spaces. Let this building serve similarly to a non profit center if it will be taking so much of the city's money. The answer is not to give more money and resources to police (to which history and several current events are paving way for understanding why we must move away from police states, and your job to take seriously the abolition efforts), but community resources and social services that deal with most of the following: food security (give the space a greenhouse and community garden space, food banks / cafeterias, health + nutrition learning classes in several languages) affordable housing & anti gentrification (let the space be shelter for the homeless i.e. accessible showers, overnight shelter, 24 hour WiFi access and charging stations, lounging areas, pass anti gentrification polices to protect the middle and lower class from displacement), affordable and accessible healthcare sites for the most impoverished (medical services i.e. expansion of community dental/clinics, STD/HIV testing & treatment centers, rehabilitating art spaces connected to local grassroots art therapists, and offices of essential city services that do not include police entities and include social security workers, welfare workers, city clerks, city water electric gas and trash services workers, local public private and post high-school school representatives. Please listen to this message and others voicing against the expansion of local and state police forces in our communities. Far too many lives have been lost, harmed, and forever changed for worse in the hands of state and local police violence and abuse. There is no space for enabling these forces if we wish for equity and safety of community, we must extend those desires to meet the most

vulnerable (lower class people or color) in their needs and demands.

This is too much money to be spent on Police. Need to reallocate some of these funds to addressing food shortages, homelessness, training for citizens re-entering job market.

Why not build a nice community rec center? Or put in beautifully designed affordable housing? Or build a park with public restrooms and showers? Why not reach out to the citizens of Ward 1 and work with them to come up with a better use of the space and money? There are so many, many, many other options besides building a new police headquarters. Options that would actually make the community safer instead of more afraid. Doesn't that excite you? Doesn't the potential for what could be done to make this community truly better for all ignite your creative spark? There is currently an opportunity to listen to the citizens of this City about what you actually make their community safer and more welcoming. The question is whether anyone in power will listen to them.

I would want to make sure that the original purpose of the building doesn't broaden too much and try to meet too many needs that overlap with other providers in the community. Partnerships are always important, but our area leans toward many organizations with overlaps in services.

I think it's important to keep accessibility in mind, have free outdoor water fountains, and plenty outdoor seating

There needs to be greater work done by the police force to reduce racial profiling. Ideally through reducing police use to only crime calls, while having people trained in peaceful interactions handling social interactions.

Keep it simple. Police & Fire station.

More money into building up the community and allowing minorities to feel safe. Social training with officers. Also, money into training recent graduates of the academy who barely pass shooting practice to not be able to use guns anytime they see fit. Proper training.

33.3 mil is way more than we need to spend on increasing police presence in our city. The "safety campus " would be an awesome resource if it wasn't a masked police complex. Fayetteville could absolutely use a community center with more resources for local organizations that try to create an equitable community for our most vulnerable populations. Those organizations could use more funding and space and resources. Police do not need this much

funding when we have hungry and houseless neighbors. How does Fayetteville have only 1 overnight emergency homeless shelter? Why are so many of our citizens struggling to feed their families?

We need to explicitly affirm our commitment to marginalized communities-- Black residents, Jewish residents, Muslim residents, homeless residents, etc. SO many are struggling and this massive project needs to explicitly address those who have been actively disenfranchised. This is not some "vigilante" speaking about this--I'm actually a moderate. But this recent climate has opened my eyes to the systemic marginalization of SO many people in our own town!

Design-Safety: This 50-foot distance thing is mystifying to me. Please see the design of the new San Francisco Police Headquarters and Public Safety Campus, completed in 2015: <https://sfpublicworks.org/PublicSafetyBuilding> . Otherwise, safety for officers is very important, as we saw with the tragic death of Officer Carr. And what is meant by the single word "Emergency"? Lumping all those things together into one specification will not provide you with useful feedback. Design-Sound Dampening: I assume Sound Dampening is for the indoor shooting range? I support this range, as you can hear the current outdoor range for miles around (when it's not flooded).

30 million dollars could be utilized in SO MANY OTHER WAYS. This entire project is an amazing waste of money, it should be sourced DIRECTLY to uplift existing community resources.

It's important to me that social service providers in the area are asked as well as the clients they serve. Many interactions that occur with FPD are because essential needs are not met. This building/safety complex has the ability to create a safer community by meeting unmet needs of the community: sobering center/detox, homeless outreach, child care, green space/garden/sports area, social workers.

The safety of our officers and of the individuals they have in their custody should ALWAYS be the top priority!! You need to decide if you want a police department or a community center. What you are outlining here is a community center. I have been an emergency department nurse for over 30 years! Even as an emergency department we do not allow the general public access to the actual ED! Only patients and the person accompanying them is allowed in the ED. The reason for that is the safety, security and privacy of not only the staff, but the patients we care for. By allowing all inclusive access of the public to the police department you are compromising the safety and well being of all of your officers and the individuals they have in their custody. By allowing all inclusive access you are literally inviting individuals to attack your officers and/or the people in their care! The public obviously had too much access to our police department the night Officer Carr was murdered. That could easily happen again with the current though process you are using. I understand the need for the department to engage with the community. But THIS is not the answer.

I would like this to be a civic building that sets the example for the traditional town form type of development we're seeking; it should be easily and safely accessible on foot or on bicycle, above all else.

Secured parking lot for officers and well lit

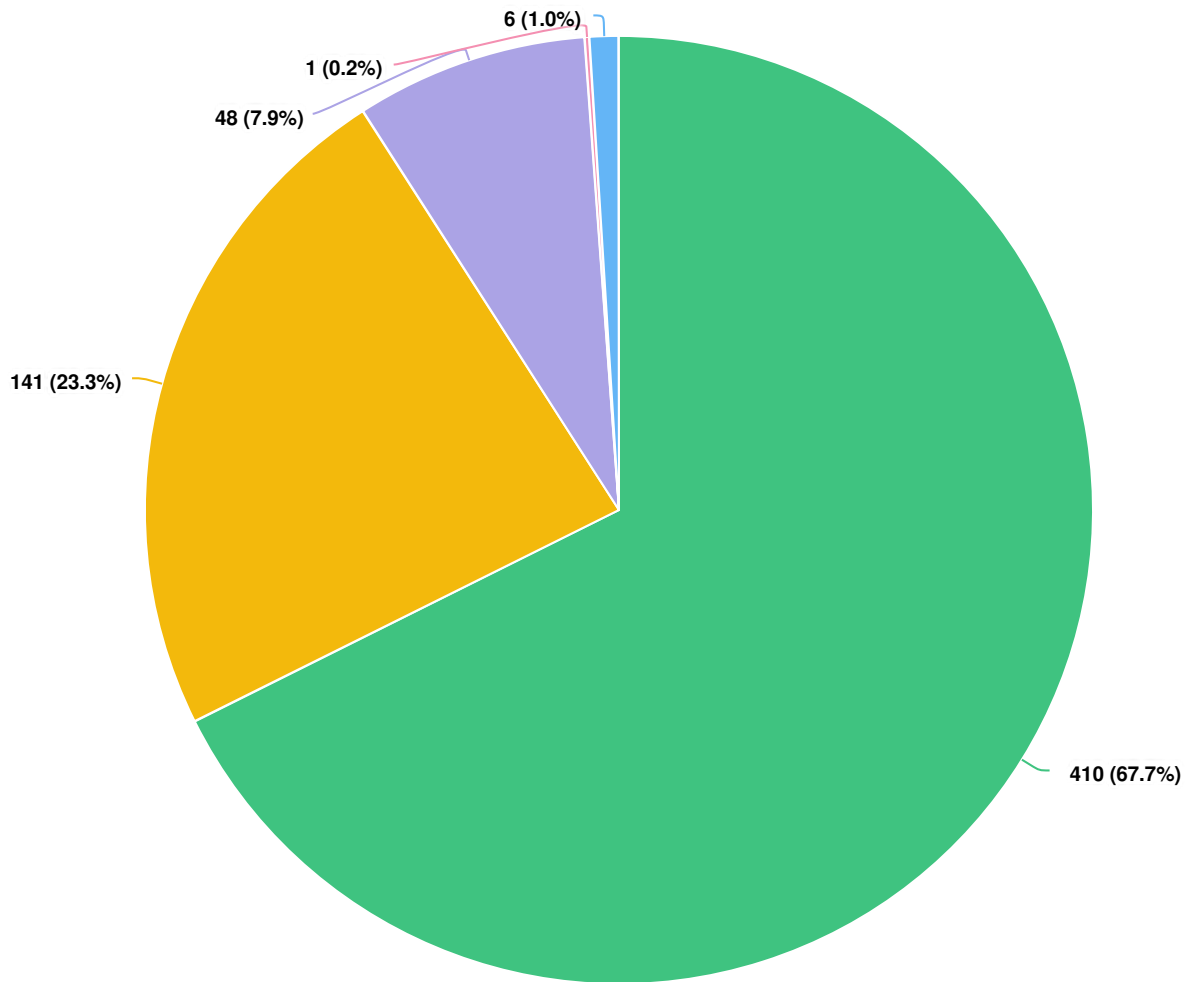

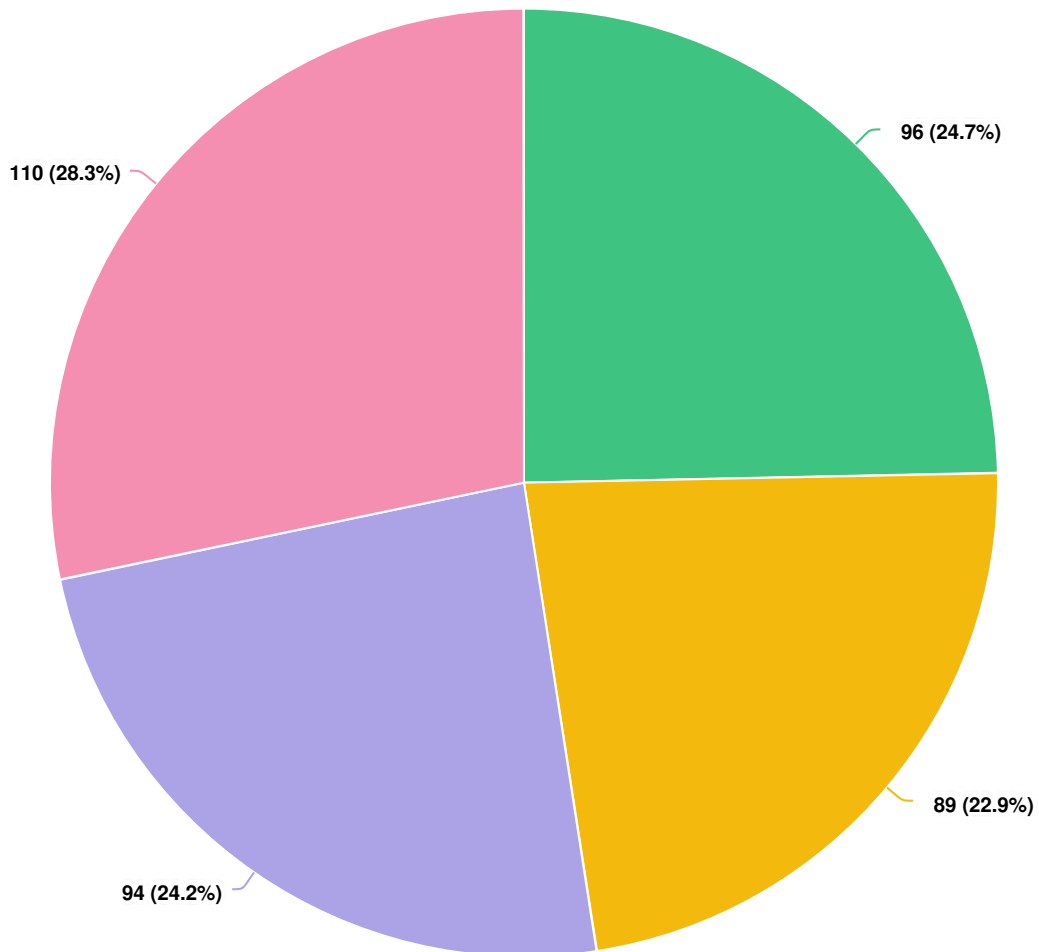

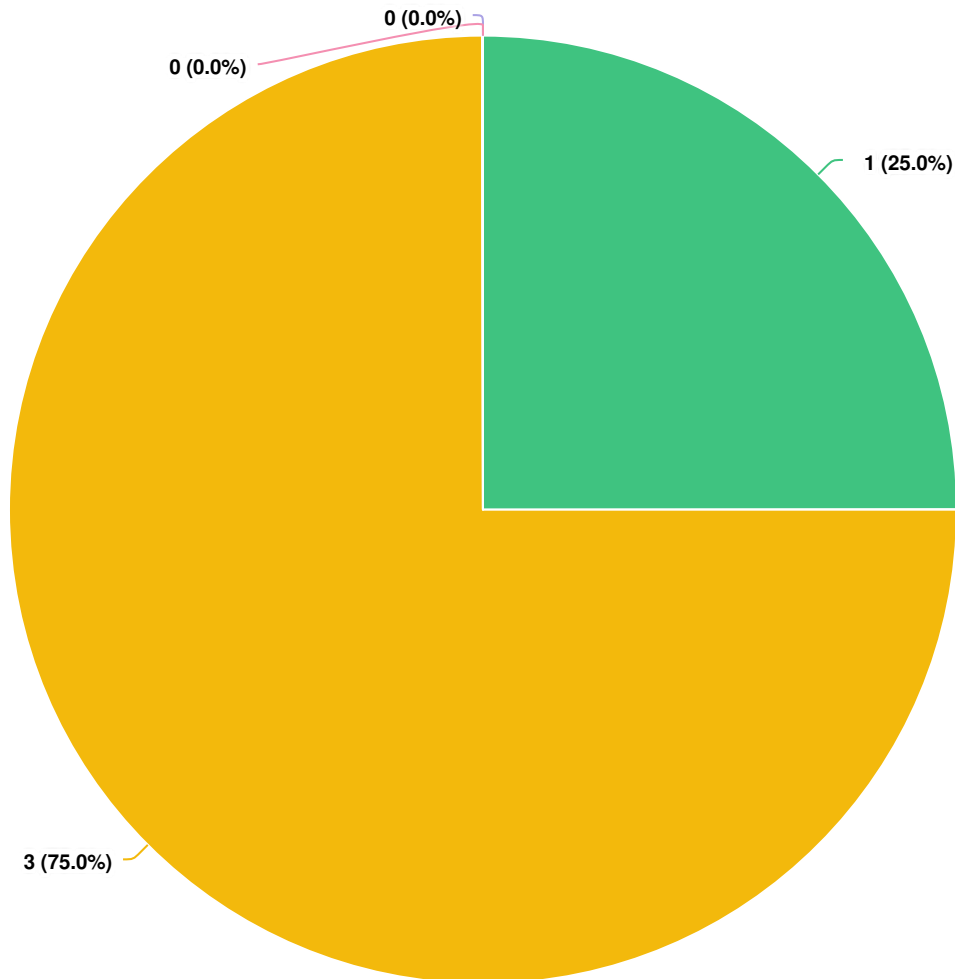

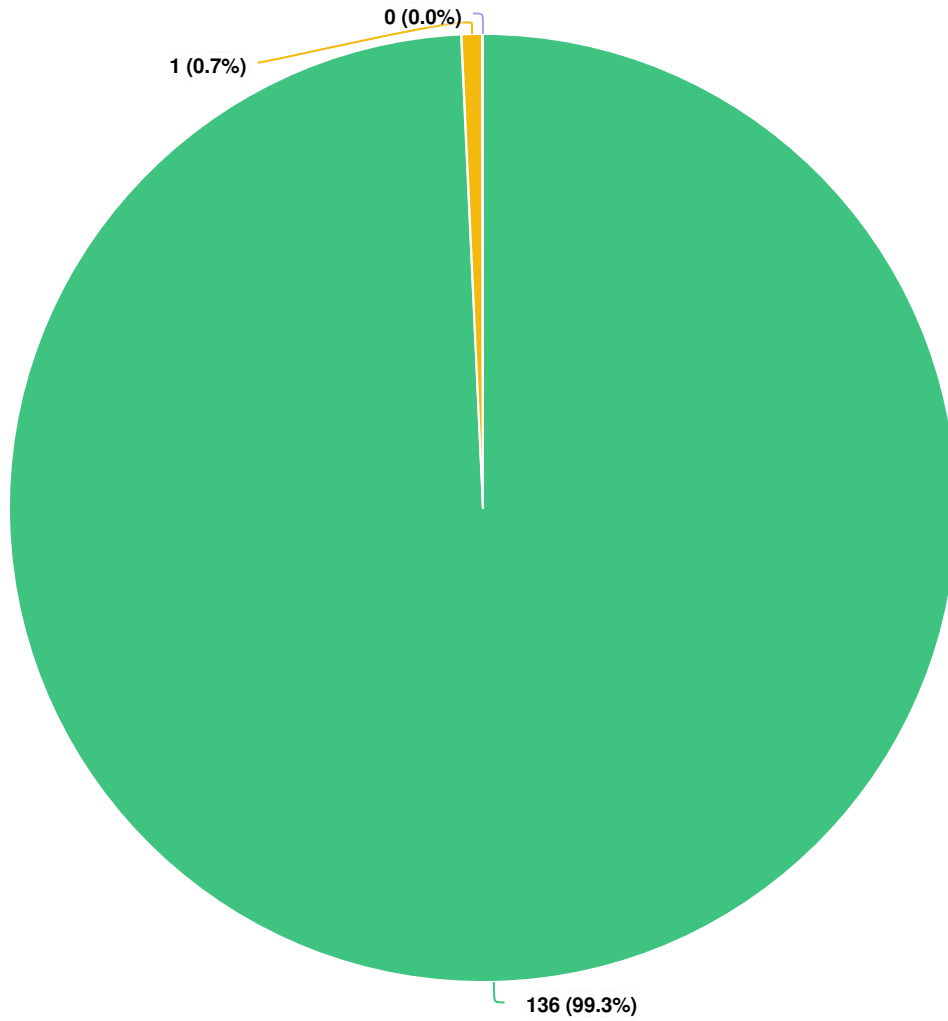

Q19 | If you live outside of Fayetteville, please choose the statement that best fits you:

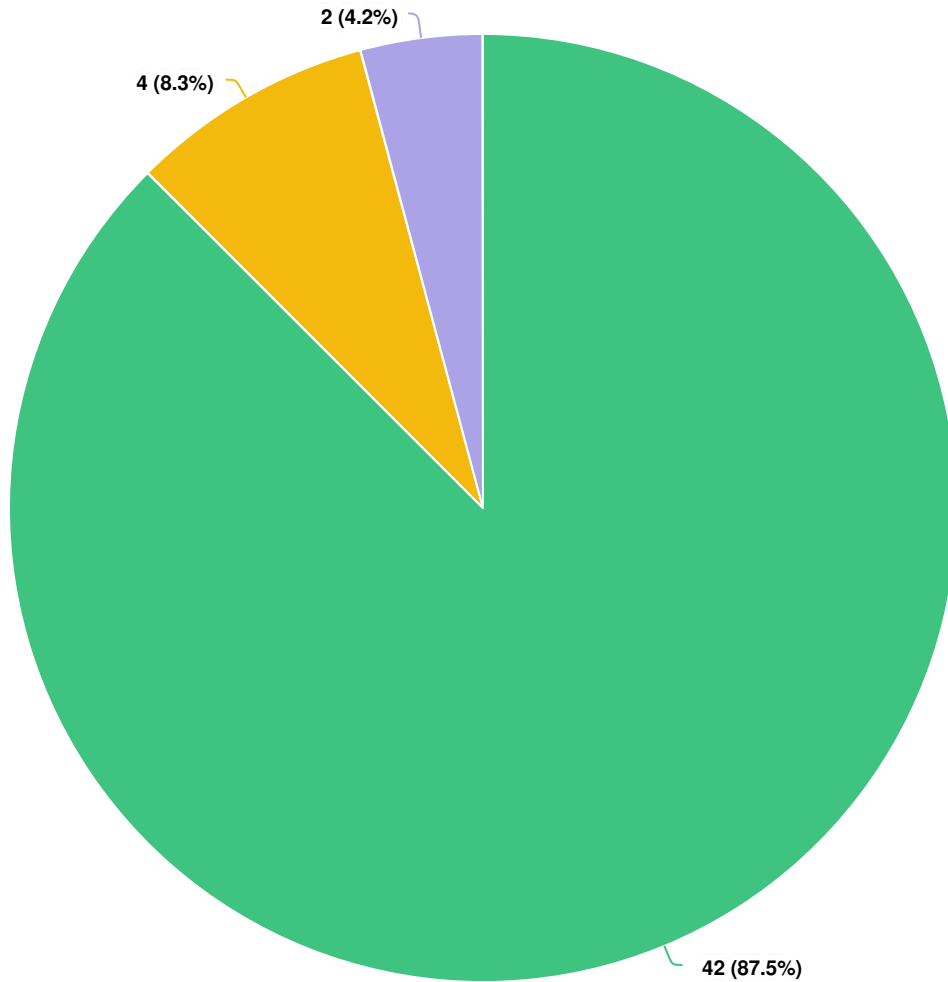

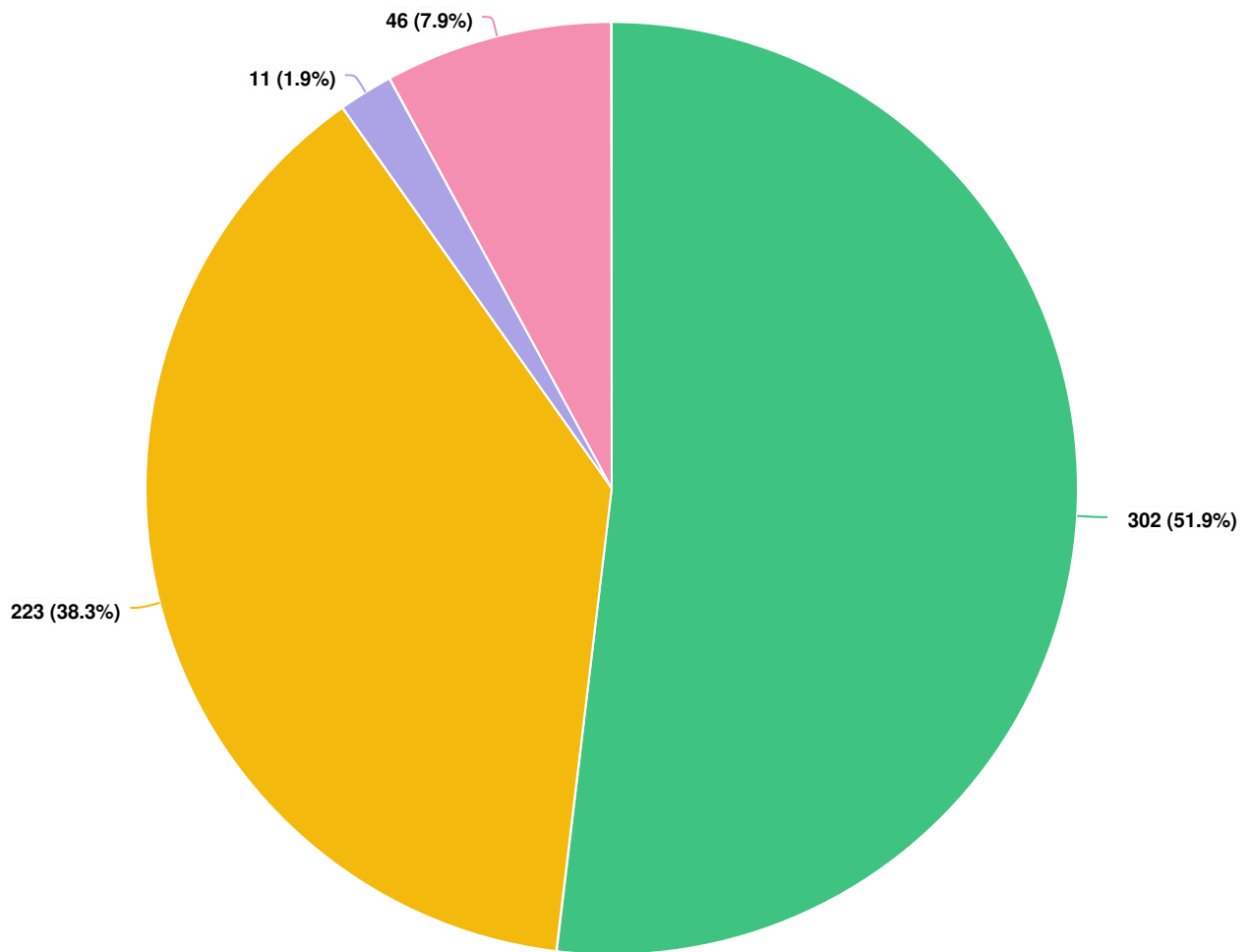

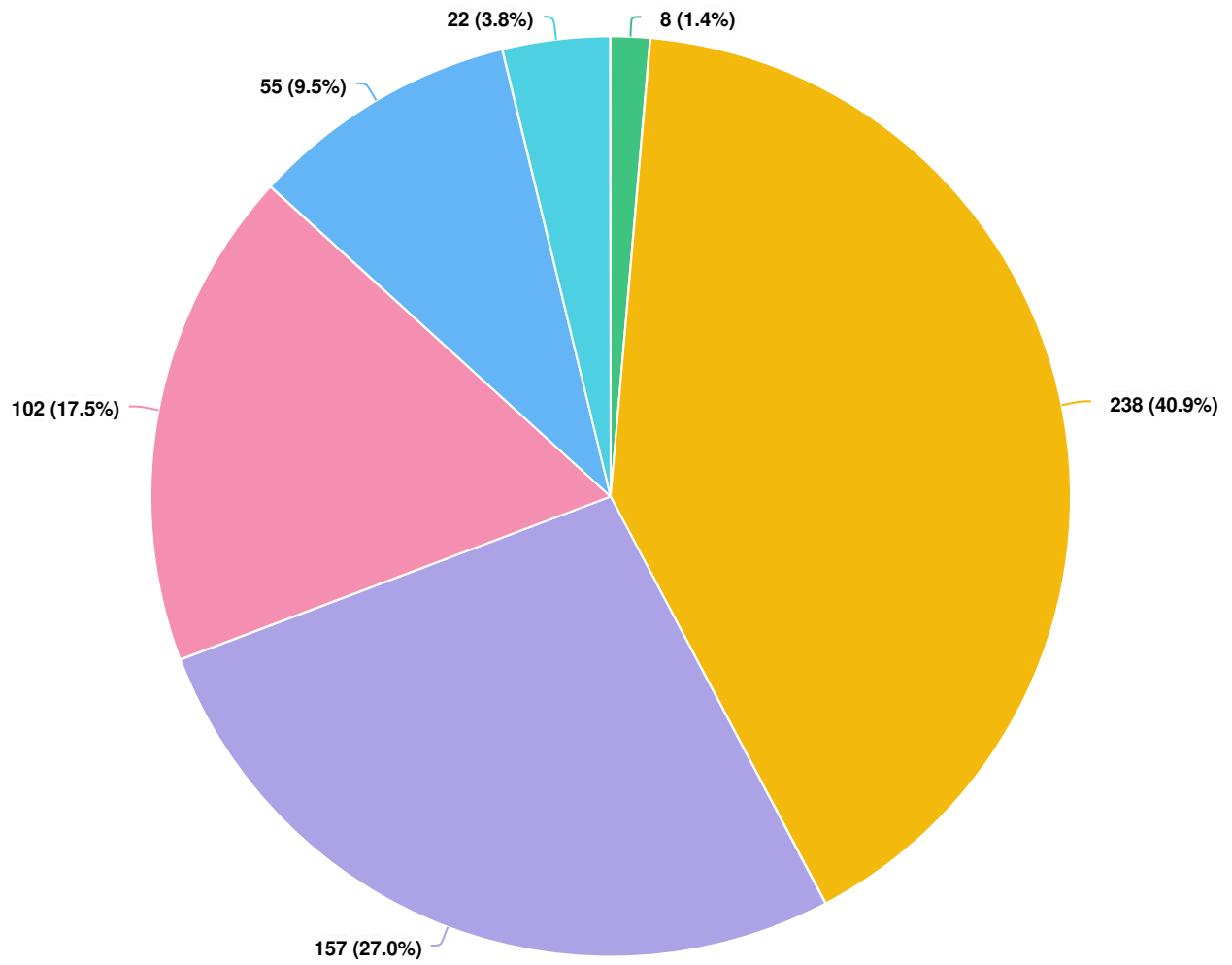

Q22 What age-range do you fall into?

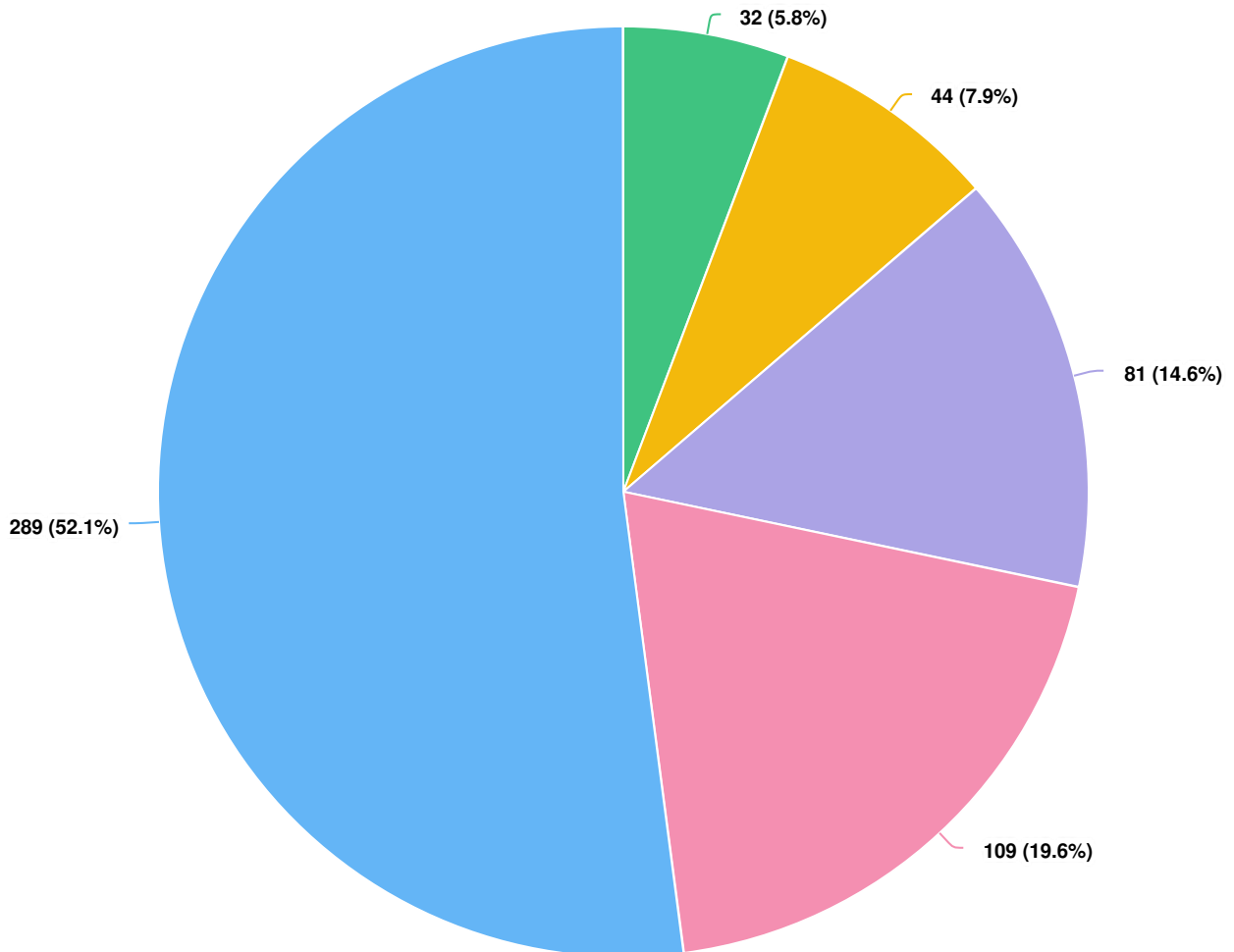
